

### Jonathan tells us:

In Waiting for Godot, two wandering tramps, Vladimir and Estragon, wait by a lonely tree, to meet up with Mr. Godot, an enigmatic figure in a world where time, place and memory are blurred and meaning is where you find it. The tramps hope that Godot will change their lives for the better. Instead, two eccentric travellers arrive, one man on the end of the other's rope.

Waiting for Godot is a prime example of what has come to be known as the theatre of the absurd. The play is filled with nonsensical lines, wordplay, meaningless dialogue, and characters who abruptly shift emotions and forget everything, ranging from their own identities to what happened yesterday. All of this contributes to an absurdist humour throughout the play.

However, this humour is often uncomfortably mixed together with tragic or serious content to make a darker kind of comedy. The results are both funny and dangerous in this existential masterpiece.

### Summary of the play

When a boat, wrecked off the south coast of England, spills its migrant cargo onto the shore, one child is left stranded on the shingle beach, alone and frightened. Alone until sees a man, waiting and watching on the shoreline, making his own choices about her destiny in ways that will have consequences for himself, his family, and the place he calls home.

This new play (by one of our members, who will also direct it) explores a very contemporary concern: the way in which we respond to the debate about our borders, the changes to our culture and what this says about our humanity. It is also a mystery; asking the audience to piece together the truth from a story that intends to intrigue and baffle. Set in a single location, it is a multi-layered narrative that hopes to engage and entertain leaving an audience much to discuss and share.

#### **Characters**

Each of these roles have the same weight and significance.

<u>David Parker</u>, a retired secondary school English teacher in his seventies. He has lived on one place all his life. Widowed. Complex.

<u>Steph</u>, David's stay-at-home daughter in her thirties, a local primary school teacher, also rooted in the area. Artistic. Diffident.

<u>Cathy</u>, David's stepdaughter in her mid-forties. She is a woman of a mixed ethnic background: black father and white mother. Metropolitan. Grounded. The actor taking on the role of Cathy also plays Reid, a BBC journalist, as a letter reader and a witness <u>Ms Way</u>, a primary school head teacher, also in her mid-forties. The actor playing this role also takes on the part of the reporter's voice, a letter writer, and a witness.

### About the Playwright/Director

Robert has had work staged at the Sherman Theatre, Cardiff and Calgary Theatre, Canada as well as pub theatres in London and Leicester.

He has written numerous site-specific works for Heritage Lottery, many in Cheshire, from 1993-2015. In the dim and distant past, he ran a TIE company and one specialising in murder mysteries.

Robert is a senior member of the Guild of Drama Adjudicators working across the UK and abroad. He works as a professional arts and culture consultant, providing project management support as well as conducting independent evaluations for Arts Council England-funded organisations.

This followed time spent working in the education sector: in schools, advisory services and universities.
